Teacher Education Seminar Report Introduction to Global Education

As part of a cooperation agreement between the Global Education Network Europe (GENE) and the Institute of Educational Policy of the Greek Ministry of Education and Religious Affairs, a series of online teacher education seminars on Global Education were planned for late 2021 and early 2022. The initial seminar took place online on Monday 20 December 2021, with over 1300 teachers in attendance. This short report offers an overview of the session.

Official Opening

Dr. Georgia Fermeli of the Greek Institute of Educational Policy (IEP) welcomed the IEP's President, Dr. Ioannis Antoniou, the Director of the Global Education Network Europe (GENE), Mr. Liam Wegimont, the Head of the Directorate of European and International Affairs of the Greek Ministry of Education and Religious Affairs, Mrs. Vasiliki Makri, and all the participants to the first introductory webinar of the series of webinars on Global Education. She then invited Dr. Antoniou, Mr. Wegimont and Mrs. Makri to offer their opening remarks on behalf of their respective institutions.

Dr. Antoniou welcomed everyone to the webinar and proceeded to speak about the established partnership between the IEP and GENE, specifically citing their collaboration around policy design and the collection and sharing of data that informs Greece's six-monthly reports on Global Education which are presented at GENE's Roundtables. Dr. Antoniou mentioned that the latest 45th Roundtable. brought together representatives from over 50 ministries and agencies, and focused on the process of creating a new declaration for Global Education in Europe to 2050 that focuses on current key issues such as climate change.

This process, he continued to say, offers stakeholders the opportunity to discuss existing policies and practices and see how this new declaration can be jointly created. The IEP contributed to this process by providing updates and information regarding educational reforms and best practices that have taken place in Greece, including its new skills-building experiential workshops programme, the introduction of English language lessons at the pre-primary level, new curricula, actions for the educational support of children of refugee background and Roma children, as well as the actions for the enhancement of special education schools.

Finally, Dr. Antoniou expressed how honoured they feel at his institution to have received the GENE Global Education Award for their 21st century skills-building experiential workshops and national recognition for two other programmes that they have implemented, namely, the Open Schools for Open Societies and the pilot programme for introducing English language at the kindergarten level. Dr. Antoniou concluded by thanking GENE for leading this webinar series that aims towards the professional development of educators in Greece.

Liam Wegimont welcomed everyone on behalf of GENE and expressed his gratitude for everyone's presence at the webinar. He then thanked the Greek Ministry of Education and the Institute for Educational Policy for inviting GENE to lead this training before offering his welcoming remarks. He spoke about the sacred and fundamental role of the teacher in human societies across time. He specifically spoke about the teachers' role in helping their students develop the possibilities that lie within them. Mr. Wegimont stated:

"As teachers, we need to provide our students with the ability to understand the world as it is, and to imagine the world as it might be - a world of greater justice for all, of greater sustainability, of openness to others and of care for each other and for the earth - that is at the core of what it means to be a good teacher. It is also at the heart of Global Education".

Mr. Wegimont concluded with his wishes for a good session and a prosperous new year.

Finally, Dr. Fermeli invited Mrs. Makri to offer her welcoming remarks on behalf of the Greek Ministry of Education. Mrs. Makri expressed her joy and honour to be addressing the participants of this webinar that results from the very fruitful collaboration between the organising institutions. After briefly explaining GENE's main scope of work, she described how the Greek Ministry of Education actively collaborates with GENE to promote Global Education through the exchange of best practices and educational policies and priorities at a national, European and international level.

She expressed that modern day global and complex issues have made it essential for our students to acquire the necessary knowledge and skills to become active and responsible citizens of our global society. Education is the key, she said, that opens people's horizons and guides them in the best way possible towards change for improvement.

During this webinar she concluded, participants will have the opportunity to learn about the policies driving global citizenship education and hear about the research and practices that have been implemented in this field over the last few years. Echoing Dr. Antoniou, she mentioned that it was a great honour for Greece to receive GENE's Global Education Award for their project.

Finally, she wished everyone to enjoy the webinar, which as she explained is an important part of the systematic collective effort for the professional development of the Greek community of educators who seek to highlight the vision of the global active citizen. Concluding, Mrs. Makri said that the Greek Ministry of Education seeks to see the country's students of today, develop into the democratic global citizens of tomorrow, who respect humans and nature alike, advocate for securing human values, safeguard human rights and who actively participate in society.


Dr. Fermeli thanked Dr. Antoniou, Mr. Wegimont and Mrs. Makri for their remarks and introduced the trainer for the session, Mrs. Kerstin Wittig Ferguson.

Webinar Summary

Mrs. Kerstin Wittig Ferguson introduced GENE and its work and gave an overview of its mission and activities. She then proceeded to present the participants with an introduction to Global Education. After presenting the definition from the Maastricht declaration she invited participants to offer their answer to the following question via Mentimeter: What is Global **Education based on your previous experience / knowledge?**



The top answers characterise Global Education as the education that looks towards or is characterised by essential themes such as:



Kerstin thanked the participants for their inputs and continued to introduce the many facets of Global Education (GE). She then described GE as a holistic educational approach and discussed its various principles. Moreover, she presented how GE can be understood as a pedagogical answer to many global challenges before describing what must not be understood as GE. In the next step, Kerstin described how GE is met in the context of typical education settings and how it is also included in the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals. Participants were then invited back to Mentimeter to provide answers to the following two questions:

Can you share one thing you are doing in Global **Education at your school**

Participants mentioned actions related to inclusive education, learning communities, recycling environmental projects, volunteerism, activities promoting human rights, global citizenship education, etwinning programmes, actions promoting the rights of child, sustainable development economies, participation in the country's youth parliament programme, eco-schools and more.

What would be the one thing you could do in your school to further integrate Global Education

Answers included activities for inclusive education, communicating and collaborating with schools from other countries, having volunteer actions, organising experiential activities and workshops, educational community trainings, awareness campaigns, Erasmus exchanges and projects, organising common activities with other schools, community engagement projects, education for environmental sustainability and more.

Following this activity, Kerstin continued the webinar and explained how GE can be met horizontally, in an interdisciplinary approach, across all school subjects. Furthermore, she described how GE can contribute towards improving the educational culture of each place. She then continued to list the major stakeholders in the area of GE in each place and presented the very successful programme that took place in Greece that received GENE's Global Education Award. This concluded the presentation.


